RE: Overview of New GAP Guidance/Allocation

This memo is intended to provide an overview of the significant changes to the GAP process proposed by EPA's draft GAP Guidance and GAP Allocation.

1. Changes in the 2022 GAP Guidance

The draft GAP Guidance made some significant changes and clarifications to the previous GAP Guidance, including:

- Clarifies that GAP can be used to build capacity to implement environmental programs under tribal laws and regulations, meaningfully participate in EPA programs, and establish and maintain an environmental presence. The 2018 Congressional provision to provide collection, backhaul, transportation and disposal services is also incorporated.
- States that GAP funds cannot be used for implementation. The Guidance provides a
 definition of "implementation" as having received delegation, authorization, or approval
 to administer an EPA program or function and/or administering environmental programs
 under tribal laws and regulations. There are 4 exceptions defined in the Guidance,
 including work on TAS approval, demonstrated need to continue capacity building
 limited to 4 years with AIEO approval, building capacity in a new area, and PPG
 flexibilities.
- Clarifies allowable solid waste activities to include collection, backhaul, transportation, and disposal of solid waste and/or recovered resources (service delivery activities).
 Funding these activities requires either an Integrated Waste Management Plan or an ETEP with the needed information.
- The Guidance removes the requirement for a Tribe to complete solid and hazardous activities in a specific order, but strongly encourages Tribes to have an established solid waste program in place or under development before funding cleanup activities to prevent new, or recurring, unauthorized dumping on tribal lands.
- Provides that Capacity Indicators will be in ETEPs not GAP work plans and that Capacity Indicators will not represent all GAP eligible activities.

- The Guidance establishes expectations for intertribal consortia recipients to document how their work plan supports GAP-eligible member Tribes' capacity building efforts, including what capacity indicators they are helping Tribes to develop.
- A consortium receiving GAP funds in lieu of a Tribe(s) is expected to develop an ETEP that is representative of all GAP-eligible member Tribes included in the consortium's work plan.
- Documentation of GAP-eligible member Tribes' authorization is required with each new application versus each funding action.

When final, the 2022 GAP Guidance will replace the 2013 GAP Guidance and will be effective for negotiating and awarding GAP financial assistance agreements.

2. GAP Allocation Changes

The GAP allocation will provide GAP funds to the Regions based upon "number of federally recognized Tribes with active GAP awards in each region." This change is significant because the current allocation is based on the number of federally-recognized Tribes in each Region. The changes to the GAP allocation will have significant changes to Region 10. EPA indicates that the allocation will result in a \$1.556 million cut in Region 10's GAP allocation from FY22 amounts to \$29 million.

While consortium will still be able to receive GAP funds, there will be a significant reduction in the amount of funds available for EPA to award consortium and it will be unlikely that consortium will be able to receive funding without impacting Tribes. The allocation gives the Regions discretion in how to allocate their share of the GAP funds – "The methodology described below does not prescribe how regional offices award funds to GAP grantees (e.g., a region may make an award that is greater or less than the national per Tribe allocation and/or may fund grantees not included in the national regional allocation formula).

Many consortia in Region 10 benefit from GAP funds.

In FY 21, Region 10 funded 24 consortia were funded of the 257 total GAP grantees. 19 of those consortia serve Alaska Tribes, 3 serve OR/ID/WA Tribes, and RTOC serves all Region 10 Tribes. The number of consortia is relatively consistent over the last six years with new consortia forming and others going inactive.

In FY 21, Region 10 granted \$4.14 million to consortia of the \$32 million GAP funds granted. This funding level has been between \$3.9 and \$4.2 for the last 6 years. Alaska consortia received \$3.4 million (including RTOC which serves all Region 10 Tribes) and OR, ID, WA Consortia received \$725 K. Of the consortia, RTOC and the Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission in Puget Sound have much larger budgets at \$400,000 and \$350,000 respectively. The rest are funded at similar baseline levels as other Tribes in Region 10 e.g., \$125,000 for FY 21.

Disturbingly, EPA does not track how many consortia provide services for Tribes that do not receive GAP grants. Michael Ortiz in an email indicated, "[W]e do not track how many

Consortia in Region 10 provide service to Tribes that currently do not receive a GAP grant. We currently don't have a mechanism in place to track that."

3. Comment and Consultation Opportunities
